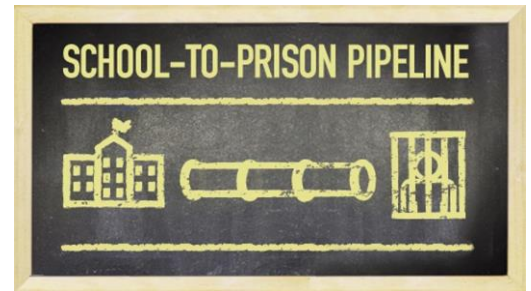


## Will you help us disrupt the Prison Pipeline?

Rates of incarceration are highest among poor, minority populations. For example, blacks in America are 40% of the nation's inmates though they comprise only 12% of the U.S. population. Furthermore, boys born into households in the bottom 10% of earners are 20 times more likely to be in prison as adults than children born in the top 10%.

These disparities have been referred to as the "school to prison" or "cradle to prison" pipelines and are caused by dynamic inequities from birth through adulthood that foster the disproportionate incarceration of minority and impoverished populations.

This pipeline restricts hope for a bright future for communities of color. In doing so, it threatens the well-being for all in America.
